Morning Worship - May 5, 2013 John 1:29-34, Behold the Lamb of God

- 1. Introduction Read John 1:29-34
 - a. This section is strangely repetitive:
 - i. John repeats verse 15 in verse 30 -15 (John bore witness about him, and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks before me, because he was before me."")
 - ii. John emphasizes twice that the Baptist, "did not know him."
 - iii. John emphasizes twice that the Baptist, "Baptizes with water."
- 2. Vs. 29 Jesus is _____as the _____
 - a. 29 <u>The next day</u> he saw <u>Jesus coming toward him</u>, and said, "<u>Behold</u>, the <u>Lamb</u> of God, who <u>takes away</u> the <u>sin</u> of the <u>world</u>!
 - i. The 29th verse is the Mount Everest of John's witness for Christ -Frederick Dale Brunner.

- b. **Behold [idou] -** to provoke attention for the coming statement of importance.
- c. The Lamb of God [amnos] literally a young sheep
- d. Who takes away [airo] to lift up and carry away
- e. **sin of the world [hamartia] -** the moral consequence of having sinned guilt; being evil.
 - i. Not just **sins**, plural, but **the sin** singular; not just the **fruit** ("sins") but the **root** ("sin"), that is to say, not just the <u>effects</u> but the <u>cause</u>; not just the foul <u>deeds</u> but their foul <u>source</u> and result (guilt).
- f. **World [kosmos] -** people associated with a world system that is estranged from God.
- g. The Lamb of God where does John the Baptist get this terminology? What Scriptural precedent is there for "Lamb of God?"
 5 Ideas throughout history
- 1. <u>The Suffering-Servant Lamb</u> of Isaiah 53 [written in 700 B.C., hundreds of years before the life and death of Christ.]
 - Isaiah 53:7-8 He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth; like a <u>lamb</u> that is led to the slaughter, and like a <u>sheep</u> that before its shearers is silent, so he opened not his mouth. 8 By oppression and judgment <u>he was taken away</u>; and as for his generation, who considered that <u>he was cut off out</u> of the land of the living, stricken for the transgression of my people?
 - ii. **Isaiah 53:4-6** Surely <u>he</u> has borne **our** griefs and <u>carried</u> our sorrows; yet we esteemed him stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted. 5 But <u>he</u> was pierced for **our** transgressions; <u>he</u> was crushed

for **our** iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with his wounds we are healed. 6 All **we like sheep have gone astray**; **we have turned—every one—**to his own way; and the Lord has **laid on him the iniquity of us al**l.

- c. Isaiah 52:13 -Behold, my servant shall act wisely; he shall be high and lifted up, and shall be exalted.
 - i. <u>Lifted up</u> [hypsothesetai] a **key crucifixion verb** in the first half of the Johannine Gospel.
- d. Isaiah 53:11-12 Out of the anguish of his soul he shall see and be satisfied; by his knowledge shall the righteous one, my servant, make many to be accounted righteous, and he shall bear their iniquities.
- 2. <u>The Passover Lamb</u> of Exodus 12 [written over 1,000 years before Christ]
 - a. **Exodus 12:5-7** Your lamb shall be <u>without blemish</u>, a <u>male</u> a year old. You may take it from the sheep or from the goats, 6 and you shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month, when the whole assembly of the congregation of Israel <u>shall kill their lambs at</u> <u>twilight</u>. 7 "Then they shall take some of the <u>blood</u> and <u>put it on the</u> <u>two doorposts and the lintel</u> of the houses in which they eat it...For I will <u>pass through the land</u> of Egypt that night, and I will strike all the <u>firstborn</u> in the land of Egypt, both man and beast; and on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. 13 The <u>blood</u> <u>shall be a sign for you</u>, on the houses where you are. And when <u>I see</u> the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague will befall you to <u>destroy you</u>, when I strike the land of Egypt.
- 3. <u>The Perpetual Lamb</u> in the Morning and Evening Sacrifices of Exodus 29:38-44.
 - a. **Exodus 29:38-44** "Now this is what you shall offer on the altar: two lambs a year old day by day regularly. 39 One lamb you shall offer in the <u>morning</u>, and the other lamb you shall offer at <u>twilight</u>.
- 4. The Triumphant Lamb of the Apocalypses Book of Revelation
 - 1. **Revelation** 5:8 And when he had taken the scroll, the four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fell down before the Lamb, each holding a harp, and golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of the saints.
- 5. Abrahamic Lamb Genesis 22:8, 13
- 6. Comprehensive View all are at least symbolic or prophetic.
- 7. CLOSE 1 Corinthians 5:6-7 -Your boasting is not good. Do you not know that a little leaven leavens the whole lump? 7 Cleanse out the old leaven that you may be a new lump, as you really are unleavened. For Christ, our Passover lamb, has been sacrificed.
